GAE MEETING APRIL 24: What You Have Always Wanted to Know about Stride, Ragtime, Boogie Woogie (and All That Jazz!)

The location for our April 24 meeting at Piano Distributors has been confirmed, even though the store has just sent out a "store closing sale" notice, according to President LeAnn Halvorson. The closing will not happen before our meeting.

Presenter Stephanie Trick was the 2012 recipient of the prestigious Kobe-Breda Jazz Friendship Award and has performed in many parts of the US as well as in Europe, and she has accepted a "gig" as our upcoming presenter for the April 24 meeting. She provided this introduction to what she will "show and tell" at our 10 AM meeting that day:

"Harlem stride piano is a style of piano playing that became wildly popular in the 1920s and 1930s. The term "stride" describes the way in which the left hand makes long leaps across

the keyboard to hit a lower bass note and alternately a chord in the middle register. Stride piano was an offshoot of ragtime, an earlier style born in the Midwest that uses heavy syncopation and elements from marches. Boogie Woogie piano developed in Chicago, coupling the form of the blues with motor-like, more energetic left-hand patterns."

If you are seeking a venue for live music performances or for your talented student performances, you may be interested in the following information that was distributed recently concerning the <u>Tavern of Fine Arts</u> at 313 Belt Avenue in St. Louis:

As the spring semester rolls on, we would like to let you know of performance opportunities for your students at the Tavern of Fine Arts. As experienced music instructors, we know how difficult it can be to find opportunities for students to gain important on-stage experience. So often they work for months or years for a single performance. So much hard work and dedication should be rewarded with more than just one performance. In the past we have featured performances by students from Washington University, Webster University, SLU, SIUE, UMSL, Unviersity of Missouri - Columbia, St. Louis Symphony Youth Orchestra, the Community Music School of Webster University, and numerous high schools and elementary schools from around the area.

The Tavern is the perfect venue to reprise the junior or senior recital, to try out a new piece, or just to gain much needed stage experience in a comfortable environment. The room is small with a great live acoustic that makes it easy to perform. We have a six-foot Yamaha piano that has recently undergone a complete overhaul by Jackson Pianos. They have regulated the action and repaired the pedals and legs. Soon they will be tightening and repairing the soundboard as well. The work has profoundly improved the way the instrument plays and sounds. We will continue our partnership with them to maintain the piano and keep it tuned and in tip top shape.

Open Stage - Second Monday (monthly)

For students who are working on just one or two pieces, we hold an open stage that focuses on classical music. It is a great opportunity for amateurs, students, and professionals to present work in a short format for an appreciative audience. Vera Parkin generously provides accompaniment for singers and instrumentalists who need it during the first hour and a half.

The next two dates are **April 13th** and **May 11th**. There is no need to register in advance, just show up and sign in. We have had performers from ages 6 to 89 on the open stage and we always have a great time.

Cabaret Open Stage - Third Wednesday (monthly)

The St. Louis Cabaret Project holds an open mic night that features music from on and off Broadway, the American Songbook, and other popular genres. Accompaniment is provided by Carol Schmidt for the entire evening and the event attracts a crowd of very talented local singers. The next event will be **April 15th**. There is no need to call ahead, just show up on the night of the event and sign in with the host, Chuck Lavazzi.

Recitals

We are happy to book students of all ages and ability for recitals lasting anywhere from 20 minutes to 2 hours (or more in the unlikely event that they have that much material!). While we have events booked for most days of our calendar, we would be happy to book shorter performances either before or after our main events. Students who have a full-length recital prepared or in the works should call (314 367 7549) or email for booking and we can find a date. It is a great way to prepare for an important academic recital or celebrate the completion of one by doing it again!

Studio Recitals

We make our room available free of charge to independent teachers for studio recitals. These are generally on Saturday afternoons and we have received a lot of positive feedback from parents who enjoy being able to order lunch or a drink while hearing their favorite musicians perform.
